

Yayoi Kusama was born in Matsumoto City, Nagano Prefecture, Japan, a place known for being surrounded by beautiful mountains. She is the youngest daughter in her family, who ran a big wholesale business that sold seeds and seedlings to grow flowers and trees. From a young age, Yayoi could hear flowers and dogs speaking to her, and she suffered from visions that made her believe she was being surrounded by a grey curtain.



Every day, as a way to cope with her fear and trauma from these illusionary experiences, she drew the visions she saw. After the Second World War, Yayoi entered an art school, where she began to experiment with different styles.





What kind of world exists beyond these mountains? She always had a dream to venture into the unknown world, and to create her own art in a place of freedom, where she could let her imagination and creativity run wild. Although at the time, it was not easy to travel overseas for Japanese people, with high hopes, Yayoi flew halfway across the world to the United States. She rented a flat in New York City where she drew and painted every day. She exhibited paintings that looked like nets, with sequences of white circles as tiny as seashells painted over black canvases. One of them was even 10 meters long.



These white net paintings with no center, beginning, or end blew the New Yorkers away, catching everyone's attention like no other.



From soft sculptures to infinity mirrored rooms, nude performances and many more, one after the next, Yayoi produced new art. It has almost been 70 years. Not limiting herself to paintings or sculptures, but also with poems, novels, films, and fashion, Yayoi still continues to challenge herself to new things.

Every day, all she thinks about is art.

From day to night, her creativity never stops.
